Course Description:

Course Expectations: This class is a geared to a students who are interested in Louisiana government and politics and who may seek internships and employment in the legislature or Governor's office. The information is relevant and useful for all students.

You must not have your cell phone out or laptop out in the classroom. You are expected to be considerate, pay attention, take notes and participate in classroom discussions.

Project: Legislative District Analysis – each student will select a legislative district and complete an analysis of the district, interview the legislator and identify issues relevant to that district. The election results for the district from the last three election cycles will be reviewed.

Guest Speakers: Guest speakers are invited on Thursday. Students should be present in acceptable attire if interested in meeting speakers to discuss internships or jobs. Professional attire is required – no shorts, t-shirts or other athletic wear.
